

Latina Advocacy Group Awards \$100K to Texas Nonprofits

The Hispanic 100 Latina Giving Circle awarded grants to 18 North Texas nonprofits serving Latina women and girls.

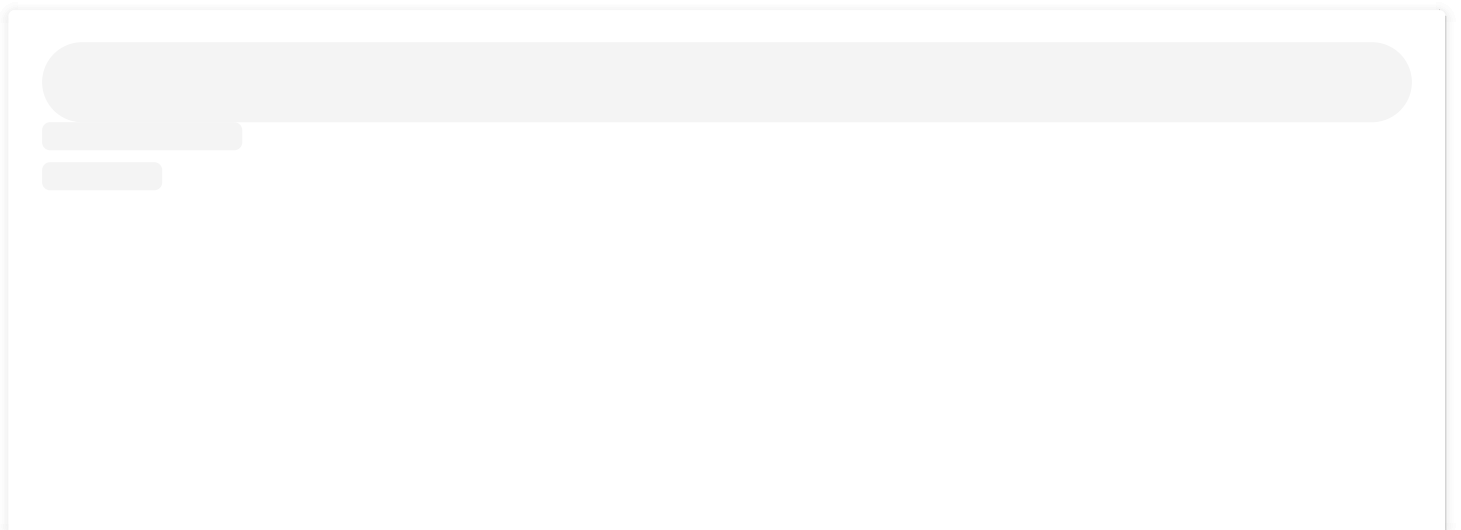

The Hispanic 100 (H100) Latina Giving Circle awarded 18 [grants](#) totaling \$100,000 to North Texas nonprofits serving Latina women and girls in low- and moderate-income communities, according to [Dallas Innovates](#).

Founded in 1996, the H100 Network is made up of Latina leaders in North [Texas](#) shaping, supporting and transforming how Latinas are perceived in business, education, health, public service and more.

The H100 Latina Giving Circle at Texas Women's Foundation (TXWF) was established in 2019 to engage Latinas in philanthropy and expand resources for local organizations.

The latest grants were awarded during a fundraising event titled Latino Living Legend. The event honored Alice Rodriguez as the 2025 Latina Living Legend and Aracely P. Muñoz as the 2025 Emerging Latina Award recipient.

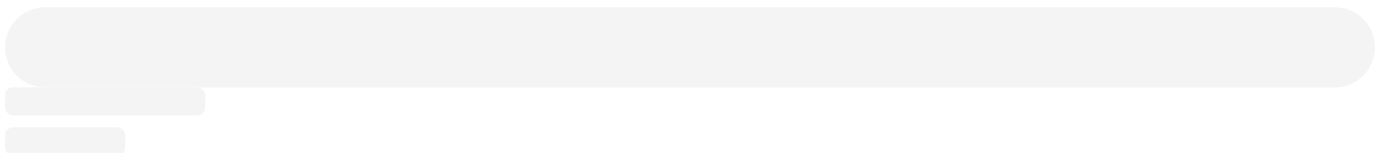

- Ascend—Latinos in Finance Bilingual Initiative;
- Cannenta Foundation—Project Ayuda for mental health services to Latina women and girls;
- Cara Mia Theatre—Second Annual Latinidades Arts Symposium;
- ChildCareGroup—Born Learning Home-Visiting Program to strengthen families and prepare children for academic success;
- Children First—General counseling program for mental health care and education;
- LBU Community Clinic—Funding for the OB program and expansion of maternal health services.

“Every member of the Hispanic 100 contributes to the Latina Giving Circle, and in partnership with the Texas Women’s Foundation, we multiply our impact.
