

# What Latinx Transgender People Need to Know About HIV Testing

Saturday, April 18, marks #NTHTD. Here's why that's important.

Transgender women of color—especial Latinas and African Americans—see disproportionately high rates of HIV. And they're at higher risk of contracting the virus. To raise awareness of these facts and to educate the communities about the benefits of HIV testing and treatment, advocates designated April 18 as National Transgender HIV Testing Day (NTHTD).

The University of California, San Francisco's [Center of Excellence for Transgender Health](#) (Trans CoE) partnered with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention to launch the awareness day, but as of last year, the transgender health center no longer leads the effort (though its website continues to offer relevant data on trans health).

"In the United States, it is estimated that around 1.4 million adults identify as transgender," according to the Trans CoE. "Transgender women are at high risk of having HIV and of contracting HIV. Transgender women of color, especially Black/African American and Hispanic/Latina women, experience disproportionately high rates of HIV. There is a gap in research on HIV and transgender men; few studies have gathered HIV prevalence data for this population."

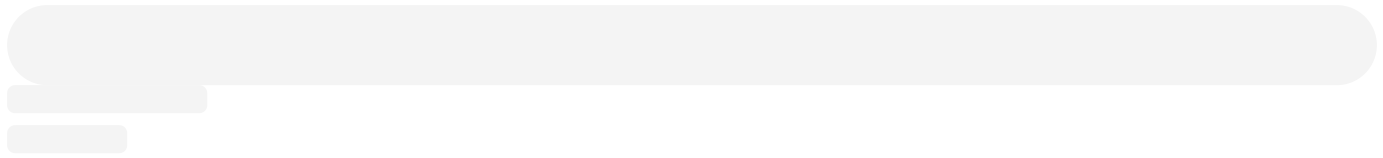

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Did you know that today is National Transgender HIV Testing Day #NTHTD? The CDC recommends that everyone between the ages of 13 and 64 get tested for HIV at least once, and that people with certain risk factors get tested more often. In surveys done by CDC, only about one third of transgender people reported ever testing for HIV.
